Policy Victories and Organizational Accomplishments in 2018

Bread for the World and Bread for the World Institute continued to focus on our goal of ending hunger through policy change amid challenging U.S. politics. Our history of working on key anti-hunger issues in a bipartisan way and from a position of faith contributed to Bread's credibility and influence even in a polarized—and on some issues, directly oppositional—political environment. Thanks to the prayers, advocacy, and financial support of Bread members and partners, we achieved significant progress in our shared mission to end hunger.

Global Food Security Act

Bread for the World played a leadership role in winning unanimous passage of the Global Food Security Reauthorization Act in both houses of Congress. The bill authorizes U.S. government programs to strengthen global agriculture, food security, and nutrition for the next five years. The bill builds on the progress already made through Feed the Future, which served nearly 11 million farmers and 23 million children in 2017.

Bread for the World members secured the support of 59 (28 Republicans and 31 Democrats) of the 133 House co-sponsors.

Farm Bill

During debate on the Farm Bill, Bread for the World members spoke out in opposition to a proposed cut of \$20 billion from SNAP food assistance and the imposition of additional work requirements. After the fall elections, in a strong bipartisan vote, Congress passed the Farm Bill with no cuts to SNAP and no additional work requirements. In fact, the final Farm Bill included

Bread for the World members helped win passage of the Global Food Security Reauthorization Act, which supports farmers in Africa and elsewhere as they grow food that is essential for mothers and children to thrive.

In 2018, Bread members generated 900 high-level contacts, 150,000 personal communications, and more than half a million other advocacy actions—all urging members of Congress and the administration to support policies and programs that will bring us closer to the end of hunger.

improvements in SNAP and international food aid policies.

Many congregations that took part in Bread for the World's 2018 Offering of Letters included the Farm Bill in their letters to Congress. Grassroots activists were mobilized at key moments during the bill's progress.

On the Farm Bill, Bread for the World members generated 92 smart calls/emails/letters, 40 in-district actions, 193 lobby visits in Washington, D.C., and 17 letters to the editor/opinion-editorial pieces.

2018 Offering of Letters: For Such a Time as This

Efforts by Congress to slash funding for anti-hunger and poverty programs have failed again and again, in part because of the advocacy of Bread for the World's members and partners. Bread for the World's 2018 Offering of Letters urged Congress to maintain and increase funding for programs vital to people who are experiencing hunger and poverty.

Happily, Congressional leadership decided, for the first time since 2010, not to push for trillion-dollar cuts to low-income programs.

At the end of 2018, Congress had not finalized appropriations, but early in 2019 they reached a spending agreement, which included

\$20 million in additional funding for global nutrition programs. This additional funding will save the lives of thousands of children and will reach 200,000 more acutely malnourished children with vital nutrition interventions.

Famine in Yemen

In response to near-famine conditions in Yemen and other countries, Bread for the World launched a national digital petition in November. The petition called for an end to U.S. support for the Saudi coalition and increased humanitarian assistance in Yemen. The petition generated more than 30,000 signers within two weeks. The petitions were delivered to Senate offices the night before they voted on a resolution to end U.S. military support for the Saudi coalition. That evening, the petition and Bread's work were mentioned on CNN's *The Situation Room with Wolf Blitzer*. The resolution passed in the Senate the next morning.

First Step Act

Bread for the World has been working to reform our nation's criminal justice system, a critical step to ending hunger and poverty in the United States. In December, President Trump and a bipartisan group of Senators endorsed The First Step Act. Bread for the World endorsed this bill and urged its passage. The bill passed in the House and Senate with strong bipartisan margins.

The First Step Act reduces mandatory minimum sentences for nonviolent drug offenders and gives judges more flexibility in sentencing. The legislation provides for education, training, and treatment programs to reduce recidivism and help people reenter society. This bill is an important step forward, but it has several shortcomings that need to be addressed. Thus, working with other partners, Bread for the World will urge that improvements be made as the legislation is implemented.

Election Work

Bread for the World's 2018 mid-term election work was focused in four key states where we believed that we could have the most impact. Bread members in Arizona, Nevada, Ohio, and Florida engaged with one or two key House races and, in some cases, the Senate race. In these states, Bread staff piloted an integration of digital and on-the-ground mobilizing efforts. This integration, along with new partnerships, will be useful for work during the 2020 election.

Digitally, Bread reached 3.7 million Americans in the four target states with antihunger and poverty messages and a petition. More than 100,000 people signed the petition, and 9,000 people made calls to campaign and Congressional offices.

In Florida, Bread members met with 10 House members who were up for election. In Ohio, Bread members received written and video responses from the candidates about their positions on hunger-related issues. In Arizona, Bread members met with thencandidate, now-Senator Martha McSally and Senator Susan Collins at a big public event.

2018 Advocacy Summit and Lobby Day

Nearly 300 people participated in Bread for the World's Advocacy Summit and Lobby Day in June. In 176 meetings, participants urged members of Congress to pass a Farm Bill that would strengthen food aid and SNAP

programs and to co-sponsor the Global Food Security Reauthorization Act.

The event included an African American/ Pan-African consultation for 50 leaders from universities, churches, and nonprofit organizations. It also included a Latino Leaders Convening, which brought together 30 Latino pastors and advocates, including board members from the National Latino Evangelical Coalition, bishops from the Church of God in Christ, and pastors from Disciples of Christ.

2018 Hunger Report

Bread for the World Institute's 2018 Hunger Report, *The Jobs Challenge: Working to End Hunger by 2030*, was launched in April at the National Press Club. The report highlights the role that a well-paying job plays in reducing hunger and poverty. It lays out a menu of policies that would improve job opportunities for Americans who are experiencing hunger and poverty. The last chapter of the report argues that jobs issues are also crucial to progress against hunger and poverty in developing countries.

In 2018, Bread members conducted 669 lobby visits, which included 123 in-district visits, 176 visits to Capitol Hill congressional offices during the Advocacy Summit, and 370 visits in Washington, D.C., throughout the year.

Global Nutrition

Bread for the World Institute continues to urge the U.S. government to make global nutrition a higher priority. In September, the Institute hosted a Faith Leader Consultation for Global Nutrition bringing together 30 Christian leaders from 13 states. Participants met with USAID officials and congressional staff, shared stories about advocacy, and developed new skills for future advocacy. Following the consultation, participants visited their members of Congress to support a \$20 million increase for global nutrition, which as a result was included in the fiscal year 2019 spending agreement.

Applying a Racial Equity Lens to End Hunger

In May, the Institute hosted an event entitled, "Applying Racial Equity to Hunger and Poverty," which featured speakers from the Annie E. Casey Foundation, Congressional Hunger Center, Alliance to End Hunger, Prosperity Now, and Policy Link. The event launched the Racial Wealth Gap Learning Simulation, an interactive tool that illustrates the connection between racial inequity and hunger. The Institute has been invited to present the simulation to congressional staff in the Senate and House.

Capacity Building

Bread for the World Institute received grant funding to recruit and support Bread leaders and teams in four states in the southeast region—Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee. In Florida, new Bread teams were organized in Tampa and Jacksonville. As a result, 17 in-district meetings took place across the state during the August congressional recess. In North Carolina, regional and statewide advocacy trainings reached more than 200 people, and 45 people assumed leadership roles in Bread teams across the state.


