


Oregon

A Hunger and Poverty Snapshot

Between 2019-2021:

- Food insecurity in Oregon averaged 10.3%.¹
- Oregon's food insecurity rate was slightly lower (0.1 percentage point) than the national average of 10.4%²
- The official poverty rate (which does not account for income from safety-net and tax-support programs such as SNAP, EITC, and others) in the state averaged 9.0%.³
- But using the Supplemental Poverty Measure (which does include safety-net and tax-support income), the poverty rate falls to 7.0%.⁴ In other words, these programs reduced the poverty rate in Oregon by 22% and the number of people living in poverty by 80,000.⁵
- SNAP, alone, lifted 117,000 people above the poverty line in Oregon, including 50,000 children, per year between 2013 and 2017, on average.⁶



Nutrition and Health

Diabetes and other diet-related health costs in Oregon were estimated to be \$4.3 billion⁷ in 2017.

9.5% of the adult population in Oregon has been diagnosed with diabetes in 2020.8 This includes:

- 19.7% of seniors.
- 12.0% of adults with less than a college diploma.
- 12.2% of adults with incomes of less than \$25,000.

Every year an estimated 25,0529 adults in Oregon are diagnosed with diabetes.

Only 12.9% of adults in the state are meeting recommended fruit intake and 12.2% recommended vegetable intake. 10

Why Bread for the World is Focused on the Farm Bill

The Farm bill is scheduled to be reauthorized in 2023. No legislation has more impact than a farm bill on the US food system and the nation's ability to provide healthy food at affordable prices to everyone.

Bread for the World's farm bill priorities include a focus on nutrition, equity, and sustainability. We believe Oregon has a lot to gain from a farm bill legislated with these priorities in mind.

Nutrition Equity Sustainability

Bread for the World supports strengthening SNAP in Oregon.

Not only is SNAP the flagship food security and nutrition program, it is indispensable to better health outcomes and economic prosperity.

In 2021, 17% of Oregon residents were helped by SNAP.¹¹

- Roughly 286,800 workers in Oregon live in households that participated in SNAP in 2021.¹²
- SNAP helps 1 in 7 workers in Oregon put food on the table.¹³
- 52% of SNAP participants were in families with children, and 41% in families with members who are older adults or are disabled.¹⁴
 100% of all SNAP-eligible people in Oregon participate in the program.¹⁵

Bread for the World supports farm policies that promote a more equitable food system in Oregon.

The Oregon population is 74% white. According to the most recent Census of Agriculture, 94% of farmers and ranchers (producers) in Oregon are white and occupy 92% of all farmland. 16

- Black producers represent <1% and occupy <1% of farmland.
- Hispanic producers represent 3% and occupy 2% of farmland.
- Asian producers represent 1% and occupy <1% of farmland.
- Indigenous producers represent 1% and occupy 4% of farmland.

Bread for the World is committed to eradicating food insecurity by building a more sustainable food system in Oregon.

Reducing unnecessary food waste is one way to build a more sustainable food system.

In 2019, 1.17 million tons¹⁷ of surplus food in Oregon went to waste instead of reaching those who needed it, an amount equal to:

- 1.86 billion meals unsold or uneaten.¹⁸
- \$4.88 billion in lost sales.¹⁹
- Annual CO2 emissions produced by 726,131 gasoline-powered cars.²⁰,²¹
